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Does the Theory of Evolution Make Sense?

Does God exist? The answer can ONLY be 'yes' or 'no', yet the evidence for the existence of God is clear, obvious, and everywhere, if you are prepared to open your mind and use a logical thought process.

So, what about the theory of evolution which is used by the secular world and atheists to explain the beginnings of life? This is a theory taught as fact – yet the 'science' to back this up is not at all convincing. It is not observable or repeatable so can never move beyond the status of theory. To be fair, 'micro evolution' does seem plausible. Small and gradual changes to an existing species, due to survival necessity or environmental changes, does make some sense. But the creation of life by random chance from nothing but inanimate, molten rock, or birds becoming fish, or apes becoming human, etc is without solid evidence, and requires a kind of blind religious faith.

When this theory was put together in the 19th century, scientists of the day had no concept of the immense complexity of a single cell organism. The most basic lifeforms are still incredibly complex, yet atheists, and scientists who rely on funding from the secular world,

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can't accept any other explanation than a creation by chance. Of course, the 'superhero' in their argument is time. "Anything can happen if you allow enough time", say those who are locked in a limited mindset where the physical realm is all they can conceive of, and can't imagine the incredible and magnificent creative power of the Spirit of God.

A single cell organism still contains DNA, proteins, and amino acids. Yet an atheist will claim this soup of chemicals somehow all came together at the same time and place, in the right amounts to spark into life by chance and unilaterally. Not only to become life, but to be able to reproduce. And then, somehow, mutate into something completely different that has two versions, (male and female) at exactly the same time. How much faith is needed to believe in something like that?

Although an atheist wouldn't want to admit it, atheism is still a religion because you can't know with certainty that God doesn't exist, therefore it relies on a belief. Atheism mocks those that believe in God by using what is known as a 'strawman' argument, which works along the lines of: "We invent an image of a mythical, old, bearded chap sitting on a cloud, and then we attach this image to anyone who believes in God, and attack and mock the silliness of believing in the image we created".

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However, this typical and popularised imagery is not recognisable from what you learn about God in the Bible.

Nothing could be further from the truth. But then, you would have to read the Bible and do your own research to understand this – not rely on the mockery and claims by others. Most people can't be bothered to do this research. So, isn't it at least possible that this perception has been created by mischievous and Satanic forces, deliberately to turn people away from God?

The atheist argument can be destroyed with just a handful of questions. Do good and evil exist? If yes, how do you know? Without a moral standard from above and beyond humans, isn't everyone's opinion valid? You may know murder is bad, but what if the opinion of another says it is not bad? If there is no God, there will be no spiritual life after death and people aren't therefore accountable for their actions in this physical realm – good or evil. If a person rejects God, evil and suffering will still exist in the world, but the atheist would be unable to explain why they are bad. Everything evil would be permissible, and life would have no purpose. In fact, typically an atheist will need to borrow ideas about right and wrong from the Christian view of sin to try to articulate their world view!

Those that don't want to be accountable for their sin will argue that God can't exist because there is so much evil in the world. However, leaving aside that the god of this world is Satan, and that evil, suffering and death only entered God's beautiful and pure creation because man caused it with the original sin, the logical conclusion is that we KNOW God exists BECAUSE there is evil in the world.

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
