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Does The 'Big Bang Theory' Make Sense?

Does God exist? The answer can ONLY be 'yes' or 'no', yet the evidence for the existence of God is clear, obvious, and everywhere, if you are prepared to open your mind and use a logical thought process. Just look around. Where did all this 'stuff' come from?! The secular world view, atheists and many scientists can't seem to get past the idea that everything came from nothing, randomly, and as a result of the so-called Big Bang. Explosions tend to destroy things and break them apart, but this Big Bang must have been special to be able to create everything. In fact, so special that Stephen Hawking (world-renowned Theoretical Physicist and Cosmologist) once said:

"If the rate of expansion one second after the Big Bang had been smaller by even one part in a hundred thousand million million, it would have re-collapsed before it reached its present size. On the other hand, if it had been greater by a part in a million, the universe would have expanded too rapidly for stars and planets to form".

Now that is REALLY special!

And yet here we are, defying all the odds. The amount of blind faith needed to believe this happened by random

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chance is equally astronomical. Scientists and atheists clearly believe in miracles.

Meanwhile, the more scientists find out, it seems the more extreme and complex their theories become, until nobody can agree on multiverses, pockets of universes, universes with different expansion rates in different parts, infinite expansion, infinite expansion and contraction, the universe as a hologram, etc... In fact, the solution of 'anything but God' is preferred, maybe because the 'God' option doesn't secure endless funding for scientists. And the existence of God would mean the secular world would need to accept that maybe it needs to think long and hard about its approach to sin. But sin is way too much fun to give up, and an acceptance of the existence of God places demands on people to face into, and address, their moral standards and behaviour.

Alternatively, here is a much simpler explanation for the existence of everything:

The physical realm in which we exist must have three ingredients: space, time, and matter. They are connected in that they all must have come into existence at the same time. For example, if space and time were created, but not matter, then 'what' would have been created? If space and matter were created, but not time, then 'when' would creation have happened? If time and matter were created, but not space, 'where' would they have been

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So, if we accept that a supreme being exists outside of space, time, and matter to be able to create these three things, then it isn't much of a leap to accept that such a being isn't constrained by them either. In other words, the supreme being would be omnificent, omnipresent, omnipotent, omniscient, omnifarious. 'It' would also have the quality of 'personhood' in that creating everything from nothing would be a conscious choice and decision.

This is starting to look and sound more and more like the God of the Bible!

The God of the Bible is spirit. He exists beyond, within, and is in control of, the physical realm. Creation is explained in the first few words of the Bible. In the beginning (time), God created the heavens (space) and earth (matter). Simple. The Bible says that God 'spoke' the physical realm into existence. Of course, we don't know how He did it, how can we? We aren't God, and mankind only knows a tiny fraction of all there is to know. But just because an ant doesn't know how an aeroplane was designed to fly, doesn't mean it wasn't designed to fly.

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
