What is Trust?

Examples of Trust in Scripture

- 1. **Abraham:** Abraham's life is a remarkable example of trust. God asked him to leave his country and go to an unknown land. Later, God tested Abraham by asking him to sacrifice his son, Isaac. Abraham's trust in God was unwavering, and because of his faith, God provided a ram as a substitute for Isaac. Genesis 22:13-14 records this profound act of trust.
- Daniel: Daniel trusted God even when facing the threat of death in the lions' den. His trust in God's protection was rewarded, as God shut the mouths of the lions. Daniel
 6:23 highlights this: "Then the king was exceedingly glad, and commanded that Daniel be taken up out of the den. So Daniel was taken up out of the den, and no kind of harm was found on him, because he had trusted in his God."
- 3. **The Widow of Zarephath**: In **1 Kings 17:8-16**, a widow trusted God's provision when the prophet Elijah asked her to use her last bit of flour and oil to make bread for him. Her trust led to a miracle where her jar of flour and jug of oil never ran out during a famine.

How Can We Grow in Trust?

 Know God's Word: The Bible is the primary way God speaks to us. The more we know His Word, the more we understand His promises and character. Romans 10:17 says: "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ."

- 2. **Pray**: Prayer is a conversation with God. By bringing our fears, doubts, and concerns to Him, we strengthen our relationship and learn to trust Him more. **Philippians 4:6-7** encourages us: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."
- 3. **Remember Past Faithfulness**: Reflecting on how God has been faithful in the past can strengthen our trust. Keeping a journal of answered prayers and blessings can serve as a reminder during tough times.

Even when circumstances seem bleak, we are called to trust God. Isaiah 26:3 offers comfort: *"You keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on you, because he trusts in you."* Trusting God does not mean life will be free of challenges, but it does mean we can face them with peace, knowing God is with us.
