What is Mercy?

In the biblical context, God's mercy is His compassionate love toward us, forgiving our sins and offering salvation, though we are undeserving. God's mercy is continuous and never-ending, renewed each day for those who seek Him.

The Mercy Shown to Israel: Throughout the Old Testament, God demonstrates His mercy repeatedly to the people of Israel, despite their constant rebellion and sin. One of the clearest examples is found in Exodus 34:6-7, where God reveals Himself to Moses: "The Lord, The Lord God, merciful and gracious, longsuffering, and abundant in goodness and truth, keeping mercy for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin..."

The mercy seat represented God's provision for atonement, sparing the people from the judgment their sins deserved.

- 3. Jesus Christ, the Ultimate Expression of Mercy: The mercy of God reaches its pinnacle in the New Testament through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Christ's sacrifice on the cross was the ultimate act of mercy, offering forgiveness to all who believe in Him.
- 4. The Parable of the Prodigal Son: One of the most profound illustrations of God's mercy is found in Luke 15:11-32, the parable of the prodigal son. The father's response to his repentant son demonstrates the mercy of God toward us. Luke 15:20 shows the father's reaction: "But when he was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him."

No matter how far we stray, God is always ready to welcome us back with mercy and compassion when we repent.

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1. God's Mercy is Abundant: The Bible teaches that God's mercy is vast and inexhaustible. Psalm 86:5 says: "For thou, Lord, art good, and ready to forgive; and plenteous in mercy unto all them that call upon thee."

- 2. God's Mercy Endures Forever: The enduring nature of God's mercy is a recurring theme in Scripture. **Psalm 136** repeats the refrain, "for his mercy endureth forever," in every verse, emphasising the eternal nature of God's mercy.
- God's Mercy Leads to Repentance: God's mercy is not just about forgiveness but also about leading us to repentance. Romans 2:4 tells us: "Or despisest thou the riches of his goodness and forbearance and longsuffering; not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance?"

His mercy invites us to turn away from sin and turn toward Him, transforming our lives in the process.

How Should We Respond to God's Mercy?

- **Receive His Mercy**: To benefit from God's mercy, we must first acknowledge our need for it and accept His forgiveness through Jesus Christ. Hebrews 4:16 encourages us: "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need."
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
